












February 15-18 & 22-25, 2018

Newcomers to the ACT include Jess Betts, Jay Tiarks, and Dakota Abbott. I must say that I don't remember the last time I was so relaxed at rehearsals. It could be due to the fact that Steve Jones and Cherie Lipp are working so hard to build and decorate the set. Perhaps it's because I can't help but laugh at some of the stories that Justin comes up with. Maybe it's because Jess keeps bringing such wonderful sweets to practices. I can't resist his cookies and cake. So much for dieting right now!!

I have always admired this classic play. I recall, as a young boy, being taken to The Guthrie Theatre in Minneapolis, Minnesota to see one of my first professional theatrical productions. My wonderful aunt, who provided me with so many cultural experiences, invited me to attend "Arsenic and Old Lace" with her and my two cousins. She kept reminding me that if anyone asked who I was , my response was to be that I was one of her sons. You see, she had received the "family discount" and wanted me to go along with her scheme. I guess favorite nephews were not included in this special package.

I was mesmerized by what I saw that day. I vividly recall how the two aunts were serving elderberry wine in these fancy goblets. It reminded me of the wine that we drank during monthly Communion at church. I was fascinated by the two elderly aunts in the play and wondered if this were a true story. These ladies certainly were

eccentric and applied a logic in life that I simply couldn't understand. (Once you see the show, this will all make perfect sense.) I recall being terrified by the character of Jonathon. He was so cruel to everyone else in the play!! I feared that he might come out into the audience and grab me taking me off to a fate that I simply didn't want to consider!! Most of all, there was this window-seat that intrigued me especially when I discovered how this important piece of furniture fits in the play. I wanted to go on stage and look inside of the window-seat to discover all of the things inside of it. I was fascinated yet a bit nervous about looking inside thinking that some strange force might compel me to be zapped into the seat like Heather O'Rourke ended up being inside of the TV in Spielberg's "Polteraeist."

As these great memories come back to me, I can't help but feel excitement about directing "Arsenic and Old Lace." It will be an incredible experience sharing this unique story of the dysfunctional Brewster family with an audience. I truly hope that everyone embraces this play like I did. I look forward to seeing all of you at one of our eight performances beginning the weekend of February 15-18 and February 22-25. #### **Spotlight on Boris Karloff**

The role of Jonathan Brewster in the original production of *Arsenic and Old Lace* was played by English actor William Henry Pratt (November 23, 1887 - February 2, 1969), better know by his stage name Boris Karloff. Known mostly for his horror films, Karloff portrayed Frankenstein's monster in *Frankenstein* (1931), *Bride of Frankenstein* (1935), and *Son of Frankenstein* (1939), which resulted in his immense popularity. He also appeared as Imhotep in *The Mummy* (1932).

His best-known non-horror role is as the Grinch, as well as the narrator, in the animated television special of Dr. Seuss's *How the Grinch Stole Christmas!* (1966). For his contribution to film and television, Boris Karloff was awarded two stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

Although Frank Capra cast Raymond Massey as Jonathan Brewster in the film version of *Arsenic and Old Lace* (which was shot in 1941, while Karloff was still appearing in the role on Broadway), Karloff reprised the role on television in the anthology series *The Best of Broadway* (1955), and with Tony Randall and Tom Boslev in a 1962 production on the *Hallmark Hall of Fame*.

#### From the Director of Development..Sharon Larkin **EXCITING CHANGES FOR ACT**

over the forty-one years ACT has been in existence. The purchase and move to the building on Superior Ave in Tomah in 2002,

after being forced to leave Fort McCoy, was an exciting change. Only five years later, your Board of Directors made the bold move to purchase the building on Kilbourn Avenue that we now call home. Challenges come with running any business and it is the way they are faced that determine success or failure. There is no doubt that any future year will be as eventful or as challenging for ACT as this year has been. The year began with having to raise enough money to install a desperately needed new roof over the second floor, along with repairs to the air conditioning system. We are so grateful for the generous donations that ACT received toward those projects.

After the roof was installed, the Chamber of Commerce, who had been renting a large portion of the first floor, moved to another location, and we found ourselves facing another challenge. But your Board of Directors made another bold move and decided to utilize that area with ACT offices, a library for scripts and a new box office! Those weeks were very busy, moving all the files and furniture down from the second floor. It took many volunteer hours of labor to make the move, followed by more hours to paint and decorate the inside as well as the outside of the building. Kudos to Farmer Construction for donating labor and materials to spruce up the outside steps! But things didn't stop there. During that time, it was discovered the lower roof over the first floor entry needed replacing. Money was raised and that project was completed.

We were on a roll and not intending to stop! With money from a recent grant, we replaced the flooring in the first floor reception area, near the elevator. Ray Olsen Construction donated time and material to widen three doorways and once again we used ACT volunteer labor to paint the walls and donated money to purchase

There have been many exciting times new furnishings for that area. At the same time, we began another huge project on the second floor. Doorways have been removed and widened, new flooring has been installed in the entire hall, new furnishings are on the way and walls are being painted. The second floor women's bathroom is being redecorated and with money from another grant, a bathroom that has been out-of-order since we purchased the building is being remodeled into a large handicap restroom. Most of the labor and furnishings for the second floor projects have been donated.

> Recently, ACT was given some nice used kitchen cupboards and countertops. We have desperately needed a remodeling in the upper kitchen so that project was undertaken as well. Ken McClurg has donated his time to install the cupboards and John Shuck is donating his time to move the sink and dishwasher. The newly remodeled kitchen will have more work area and will be more efficient.

> Once again, thank you to those who have helped us come so far in such a short time. We look forward to eventually replacing the worn out carpet in the two banquet rooms and enjoying the beautiful new ACT building! Most of the projects should be finished before the next play in February. Come to the play and take a look! The ACT offices are open most weekdays from 10 - 3, and sometimes longer. You are welcome to stop in any time to visit us. When you drive by the building, take notice of the new look, with the new paint and signage, there is no doubt Tomah has a PROFESSIONAL PERFORMING ARTS THEATRE and you can be proud of that! We sure are!!!!
